It will also help us understand how changes brought about by reforms to the family law system affect the way in which family separation is managed and parenting after separation.

Information you give us during the interview will remain strictly confidential and will never be used in any way that identifies you, your child or family.

All interviewers, researchers and others involved must comply with the *Privacy Act 1988*. Very strict procedures are followed to ensure information you provide remains absolutely confidential.

How are families adjusting to life after separation?

We may talk to both parents in order to gain a full picture of the effects of separation on families. Your privacy is important to us and all information collected will be kept strictly confidential.

Your story

We know that parenting after separation can be pretty tough.

By telling your story and sharing experiences of how you and your family are adjusting to life after separation, you can help us understand:

- How do families manage parenting after separation?
- How are children's arrangements negotiated?
- What are the changes and challenges of life following family breakdown?

What is involved?

An accredited interviewer may telephone you soon to invite you to talk about your experiences of separation, caring for your children, and how you and your family are adjusting to life after separation.

Taking part is voluntary and you can choose not to answer questions.

The information you provide during the interview will be used for research purposes only and will not be provided to any government agency. Your child support will not be affected by whether or not you choose to participate in the study.

Please be assured that all information collected will be kept strictly confidential. All details that could identify you or your family will be removed.
